"I am your servant Ruth," she said. "Spread the corner of your garment over me, since you are a guardian-redeemer of our family."

"The Lord bless you, my daughter," he replied. "This kindness is greater than that which you showed earlier: You have not run after the younger men, whether rich or poor. And now, my daughter, don't be afraid. I will do for you all you ask. All the people of my town know that you are a woman of noble character. Although it is true that I am a guardian-redeemer of our family, there is another who is more closely related than I. Stay here for the night, and in the morning if he wants to do his duty as your guardian-redeemer, good; let him redeem you. But if he is not willing, as surely as the Lord lives I will do it. But Boaz's answer isn't that straight forward. He wants to marry Ruth, but there is a closer relative (which was the way things were done in their culture) who is meant marry Ruth instead.

But there is hope for Naomi and Ruth. It is because God is in control that there is hope. It is because God is in control that there is a hope for a future, because there is a redeemer.

And like Naomi and Ruth, we have a redeemer – someone who saves – in Jesus. And because we have a redeemer, we can have hope as well.
